Forum for Leaders of Social Science in HEIs (FLSS)

The Academy is convening a new forum to bring together social science leaders from across the UK to share knowledge and understanding in an informal and collegial setting. The aim is both to support the position of the social sciences within institutions and to widen understanding of shared challenges in relation to research, education and public engagement and

impact.

The Forum derives in part from the Academy's <u>Social Science in a Time of Change project</u>. This project identified a number of challenges – including around COVID-19, Brexit, research funding and changed ways of working – where discussion and collective action amongst social science leaders could make a tangible difference.

The Forum will be chaired by Professor Richard Black, an Academy trustee and PVC and Head of the College of Social Sciences at Birmingham University. The inaugural meeting is planned for mid-November.
